On 28 & 29 January 2025 Common Purpose delivered Northern Ireland Legacy

Legacy is a global campaign by Common Purpose which invests in young people across the world so they can become a connected generation of leaders with a clear vision for what their legacy will be.

We ran our third Northern Ireland Legacy programme on 28 and 29 January, at Belfast Harbour and Belfast City Hall. 102 young people applied for the programme and 76 completed it. They had a challenging and full agenda where they met with civic and business leaders from across Belfast.

This diverse group of 76 young leaders aged 18-25 came from different communities, backgrounds and beliefs. Some in employment, some not; some studying, some volunteering; many are activists, others finding their own causes. What they all have in common is their generation and the place they live, work, or study.

Without Northern Ireland Legacy these young leaders may otherwise have never met - let alone worked together to cross boundaries in Northern Ireland.

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Tourism Northern Ireland welcomes future young leaders

Young people taking part in a future young leaders programme were today given an insight into how tourism continues to make a positive contribution in Northern Ireland.

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The group, aged 18 to 25, visited Tourism Northern Ireland in Bedford Street for an immersive visit as part of the Common Purpose Northern Ireland Legacy programme.

A global not-for-profit development organisation, the mission of Common Purpose is to develop leaders who can cross cultural, institutional, and social boundaries, both at work and in society.

Founded in 1989, the organisation delivers compelling, surprising, and powerful leadership programmes and workshops in more than 100 cities and online.

The Northern Ireland Legacy programme is part of the Common Purpose Global Legacy campaign, which invests in young people so they can become a connected generation of leaders with the confidence to make a difference and a clear vision for what their legacy will be.

The group were welcomed to Tourism Northern Ireland by Carolyn Boyd, Industry Development Manager and Jessica Hoyle, Experience Brand Development Manager.

The day concluded with group discussions and presentations on pressing social issues affecting communities today. It was amazing to hear a variety of perspectives and suggestions for driving positive change.

Ner the two days, I gained a wealth of knowledge and skills, including leadership and decision-making, collaboration and active listening, adaptability and resilience, strategic thinking, and presentation and communication. I learned how to identify purpose and align it with actions, work with individuals to tackle complex issues and embrace mistakes.
