3.1	Background							
3.1.1	The Strategic Policy	and Resources Committee, at its meeting on 18th September 2020, agreed						
	to introduce additio	nal arrangements to ensure that the Council, its officers and Elected						
	Members maintain t	he highest standards of conduct in all that they do. It was agreed that the						

Council establish a Standards Committee whose main functions would be to promote, sustain and safeguard the conduct of Councillors within the Council and the probity of all the Council's proceedings.

- 3.1.2 The role of the Committee will include the promotion and maintenance of high standards of conduct by Members and officers, a commitment to joint working across political groups and between officer and Members, oversight of any training required on all matters relating to standards and conduct, advising the Council on the Code of Conduct for Councillors and oversight of the Members' Register and Declaration of Interests and associated procedures.
- 3.1.3 The Committee will seek to enhance Member/Officer relations and promote a shared understanding of roles and responsibilities when working collectively in a political environment.
- 3.1.4 In response to discussions at subsequent Committee meetings and with Party Groups it has been proposed that the new committee may also incorporate responsibility for specific roles in relation to managing some of the business of the Council, including reviewing Standing Orders and a delegated power to receive Notices of Motion. The Committee will operate on the basis of all Party membership but Members will note that this will require a facilitative arrangement with mutual agreement from all parties.

3.2 Standards and Business Committee – Proposed Terms of Reference

- 3.2.1 The main functions of the proposed Standards and Business Committee would be to promote, sustain and safeguard the conduct of Councillors within the Council; to promote a collaborative working relationship between senior officers and Members; to ensure the probity of all the Council's proceedings; and to review and improve processes in relation to bringing business before the Council, including any review of Standing Orders.
- 3.2.2 The Committee will have oversight of a Local Resolution Protocol which will deal with "low level disputes" between Members alleging breaches of the Code of Conduct for Councillors and will aim to restore positive working relationships through mediation.
- 3.2.3 The Committee will have delegated authority to consider any recommendation by the Monitoring Officer to refer any Councillor to the Local Government Commissioner for Standards in respect of any potential breach of the Code of Conduct for Councillors, particularly where the alleged breach relates to a matter which would potentially have a reputational consequence for the Council. In such cases the Monitoring Officer will retain a residual right to refer any matter to

the Commissioner for Standards regardless of whether the Standards Committee has endorsed a recommendation from the Monitoring Officer to do so.

- 3.3.4 A protocol will be developed on how information will be minuted so that personal information cannot be raised or discussed at Committee or Council meetings.
- 3.3.5 The Committee will also consider any update reports into investigations carried out by the Public Services Ombudsman / Commissioner for Standards.
- 3.3.6 The Standards and Business Committee will also seek to improve processes in relation to bringing business before the council, including referring Notices of Motion and making amendments to Standing Orders. However, it is not proposed that the Committee will have any role in relation to the agenda setting of any other Standing Committee but it will keep under review the overall business brought before the Council.
- 3.3.7 A copy of the draft terms of reference are attached at Appendix 1. These are draft Terms of Reference which will be updated based on the detail of the processes to be developed. Any updates will be brought back to Members for approval.

3.3 New Process for Notices of Motion

It is proposed that:

- In the case of urgent Notices of Motion, the proposer will have the option to take the Notice of Motion either to the Standards and Business Committee or to full Council.
- The Standards and Business Committee will have delegated authority to adopt or reject Notices of Motion. In either case, the Lord Mayor will indicate at Council those Notices of Motion that have been considered by the Standards and Business Committee and whether such Notices of Motion were rejected or adopted. In either case, the proposer only may speak on the issue at Council.
- The Standards and Business Committee will refer all Notices of Motion directly to a standing committee when the matter to which the Notice of Motion refers falls within the remit of that committee. At Council, the Lord Mayor will indicate that the Notice of Motion was received and referred. There will be no speakers on such Notices of Motion at Council.

- The Standards and Business Committee will refer Notices of Motion for consideration by full Council when the Notice of Motion relates to a <u>strategic</u> or constitutional matter.
- The Standards and Business Committee will not have the power to amend the wording of any Notice of Motion that is being referred to full Council for debate.
- Any amendments to Notice of Motions to be proposed at Council are to be furnished at least one day in advance of going to full Council and will be circulated to Party Group Leaders in advance of the Council meeting.
- In referring any matter to full Council, the Standards and Business Committee may
 determine to restrict contributions to the debate in relation to any Notice of Motion to
 one per political party. At Council, the Lord Mayor will clearly indicate if the restriction
 applies.

The proposed changes required to the Standing Orders would be brought to next months' meeting of the Strategic Policy and Resources Committee if this report is approved.

3.4 Next Steps

- 3.4.1 It is proposed that the new Committee, consisting of 20 Members, be constituted at the next AGM in June 2021. A review of the operation of the Committee and its associated processes will be undertaken in six months.
- 3.4.2 The Members have indicated a wish to have all party representation on the Committee. In order to ensure that this will happen, it will need to be mutually agreed, in advance of each new term of office, during the annual selection of remaining places on Committees, that the requisite spaces are reserved for those Parties which do not have a seat automatically allocated on the Committee.
- 3.4.3 It is proposed that amendments to the Standing Orders will be brought to the May SP&R Committee to provide delegated authority for the new Committee to refer Notices of Motion to Council and to amend the defined timescales for submission and processing of such motions to fit within the monthly meeting cycle.

3.5 Financial and Resource Implications

There will be minor financial implications associated with introducing a new Standing Committee. If the Standards and Business Committee is to meet monthly then it will require an

	associated Special Responsibility Allowance be allocated to the Chair and Deputy Chair
	positions of responsibility and funded from the reallocation of the existing Special Responsibility
	Allowance fund.
3.6	The Committee will be serviced by existing resources within Governance and Compliance
	Services, including Democratic Services. A budget will be required to cover any associated

Draft Terms of Reference

These are draft Terms of Reference which will be updated based on the detail of the processes to be developed. Any updates will be brought back to Members for approval.

The draft **Terms of Reference for the Standards and Business Committee** may include some or all of the following functions:

Standards

- promoting and maintaining high standards of conduct by elected Members and in their working relationship with officers
- a commitment to encourage positive joint working across political groups and between officers and Members and to uphold the high standards of values and behaviours in a relationship of mutual trust
- supporting and facilitating collaborative working between Members and senior officers, particularly to support the consideration of strategic priorities by relevant committees
- advising the Council on the Code of Conduct for Councillors including any revisions to the Code
- oversight of any training required to train Members and relevant officers on all matters relating to standards and the promotion of the 12 Principles of Conduct in public life, including the Local Government Code of Conduct for Councillors and any associated training identified by the Committee
- oversight of the Members' Register and Declaration of Interests
- to develop, monitor and review any local protocols required to support the **standards regime** within the Council
- to ensure adherence with the Local Government Employee and Councillor Working Relationship Protocol
- to consider any minutes of a formal meeting held under Section 5.9 of the Local Government Employee and Councillor Working Relationship Protocol [tbc re GDPR]
- oversight of the Local Resolution Protocol which will deal with "low level disputes" alleging breaches of the Code of Conduct for Councillors and is designed to restore positive working relationships through mediation¹
- consideration of any recommendation by the Monitoring Officer to refer any Councillor to the Local Government Commissioner for Standards in respect of any potential breach of the Code of Conduct for Councillors, particularly where the alleged breach relates to a matter which would potentially have a reputational consequence for the Council
- the Monitoring Officer will retain a residual right to refer any matter to the Commissioner for Standards regardless of whether the Standards Committee has endorsed a recommendation from the Monitoring Officer to do so
- oversight of the procedural requirements of any mediation process put in place to restore internal relationships between political parties, Members and/or officers

- consideration of update reports into **investigations** carried out by the Public Services Ombudsman
 / Commissioner for Standards.
- oversight of the implementation of **recommendations** made by the Public Services Ombudsman /
 Commissioner for Standards
- providing recommendations to the Strategic Policy and Resources Committee in respect of any amendments which need to be made to the **Council Constitution** in relation to the standards regime within the Council
- In respect of any other matter which may require some consideration in the context of **standards**, acting in an advisory capacity, with reports referred to it either directly by the reporting officer or by another Standing Committee
- consideration of agenda items for other Standing Committees which identify **standards** implications

Business

- receiving and reviewing all Notices of Motion and using the Committee's delegated power to recommend either adoption or debate at the next Council meeting
- Reviewing Council Standing Orders with a view to making recommendations to the Strategic Policy and Resources Committee
- initial consideration and review of Council matters that are under internal or external investigation
- keeping under review and monitoring the Council's Scheme of Delegation
- keeping under review and monitoring the Council's administrative and procedural arrangements in relation to governance



Committee Membership

It is proposed that the Committee membership is 20.

Members will be aware that the Council makes its appointments to the Committees on an annual basis and there is a requirement by legislation to group all the Committees together, with the Quota Greatest Remainder Method being used to allocate the seats.

This would result as follows:

20 Member Committee (as combined with all other Committees) - **2** remaining places

As can be see 2 Parties would not get a seat automatically and, to fill these to ensure all-Party representation, this would need to be mutually agreed at the PGL's meeting when selecting the remaining places.

This would be taken into consideration when the table of Committee places is presented to the PGLs in May, with the final 2 places reserved for the UUP and PUP. Accordingly each of those Parties would have their quota for selecting places reduced by 1.

1.3 The purpose of this report is to submit for the Committee's consideration the draft Council response to the current consultation being undertaken by SEUPB on the Peace Plus Programme 2021 – 2027. 2.0 Recommendations 2.1 The Committee is asked to consider/approve: The draft consultation response attached at Appendix 2, and; The draft cover letter attached at *Appendix 3* providing further information to SEUPB on the opportunities for closer alignment of the Peace Plus Programme with Council and Belfast Agenda strategic ambitions. 3.0 **Main Report** Background 3.1 SEUPB has recently opened the public consultation phase of the PEACE PLUS Programme (value €1 billion) to seek views on the content and administrative arrangements of the overall PEACE PLUS Programme. The public consultation document published by SEUPB can be accessed <u>here</u> 3.2 The public consultation opened on 10th March 2021 and the deadline for responses is 12th May 2021. The consultation document has been prepared on the basis of extensive cross Council engagement to ensure the collective strategic ambitions of the Council and the Belfast Agenda have been reflected. 3.3 The PEACE PLUS Programme policy objectives were developed through extensive stakeholder engagement, which took place between December 2019 and February 2020. A total of 16 public events were held across the programme area, with over 1,000 people in attendance. Over 300 survey responses were submitted. 3.4 The overall Peace Plus Programme strategic policy objectives are summarised below (indicative regional budgets have been provided against each theme for information: Theme 1 – Building Peaceful and Thriving Communities (€210m) Theme 2 – Delivering Economic Regeneration and Transformation (€143m) Theme 3 – Empowering and Investing in Our Young People (€110m) Theme 4 – Healthy and Inclusive Communities (€155m) Theme 5 – Supporting a Sustainable and Better Connected Futures (€265m) Theme 6 – Building and Embedding Partnership and Collaboration (€47m)

- 3.5 Belfast City Council's history of excellence in delivery of peace and reconciliation programmes, as well as economic and regional development programmes means that the council is uniquely placed to continue to successfully deliver both capital and revenue projects for citizens of Belfast and the region under this forthcoming Peace Plus Programme.
- 3.6 This is further amplified with the opportunities provided by Community Planning to bring statutory partners and communities together as we collectively work towards those ambitions, and in particular, the next stage of developing funding proposals.
- 3.7 The draft consultation response is provided at *Appendix 2* for Members consideration.
- 3.8 Given the restrictive nature of the consultation document prepared by SEUPB (500 character limit at each section), a draft cover letter is also provided for Members consideration. This is to ensure Council is able to ensure all the strategic opportunities for alignment of the Peace Plus Programme with the Council and Belfast Agenda ambitions are clearly articulated to SEUPB, to influence their future direction.
- 3.9 For Members information, PEACE PLUS is a cross-border programme. However, single jurisdiction partnerships (i.e. project partnerships involving organisations from a single country) will continue to be eligible for funding provided they meet the recognised objectives. Projects addressing wider economic and territorial development challenges (as previously funded under INTERREG VA) will need to involve cross-border partnerships and beneficiaries.

Financial and Resource Implications

3.10 As detailed in the report.

This funding programme will be administered and managed by the Special EU Programmes Body and a competitive application process will operate to access funding.

This would be helpful for us in thinking of content for the local plans.

Proposal to simplify the application process

Yes simplification of the application process would be welcome by applicants. Word limits in e-forms provided are overly restrictive at times.

Proposal to increase training opportunities for project partners

Yes provided it is targeted and benefical to project partners . Provision of targeted & tailored 1-1 support to each type of project at the LAP/Regional levels would be more beneficial. Simplified guidance on procurement, financial monitoring, monitoring and evaluation and compliance with PEACE PLUS Programme regulations would also be preferable.

Proposal to make the monitoring system more user friendly

In line with the draft NI programme for Government Outcomes Framework & Community Planning, we would recommend an outcomes based approach to project development, monitoring & reporting. A more user friendly simplified model of monitoring & evaluation would be along with the use of standardised templates for questionnaires & reporting should be introduced. Experience from PIV indicates that participants are increasingly reluctant to respond to questions regarding their community/religious backgrounds & consideration should be given to removal

Proposal to increase the use of simplified cost options

The use of the simplified cost option (12% salary) has been beneficial to reduce the administrative burden, The use of flat rates would be beneficial to provide increased flexibility, hower the option to use these simplified methods should be on an individual project basis not applied across the entire LAP. This will ensure a greater focus on results. Adopting a unit cost approach, similar to the current ESF Programme, would be beneficial and also help to reduce bureaucracy as well as increase the focus on results. General project elements suuch as catering cost per

Proposal to increase flexibility in project management

Welcomed as long as its risk and issues are correctly managed by all parties. Consideration of the LA role as a leading Public Authority should be taken into account and the use of LA resources which operate on a commercial basis be examined. Acceptable thresholds and guidance should be clearly defined. The potential to respond to emerging needs/community risks should also be considered.

Proposal to make indicators and reporting more focused on quality

Evaluation and monitoring are essential components to measure project impact. Whilst a focus on quality is welcome, enabling indicators to be more meaningful at a particicipant level is essential. Based on current experience, the volume of questions is excessive and levels of understanding/interpretation needs to be taken into account. Participant feedback is that Protestant/Catholic indicators are binary and need to be more broad ranging. Tailored 1-1 support to align LCCP/LAP outcomes and results to programme indicators would be welcome. The indicators

Consultation on EU PEACE PLUS Programme 2021-2027

Belfast City Council welcomes the opportunity to input into the initial proposals, which will underpin the new EU PEACE PLUS programme 2021-2027 and recognise the transformative potential that the programme presents for Belfast and wider region. We look forward to ongoing engagement and co-design approach to firming up and bringing forward the programme.

In submitting its response, the Council commends the European Commission and Government on its clear commitment to further invest during a period emerging from the Covid-19 pandemic, which has further widened major inequalities that already existed across the city and region.

In addition to providing feedback on the specific questions contained in the online consultation survey, there are a number of strategic comments the Council would wish to highlight as set out below. We believe that these should be considered as they seek further strengthen the potential of the programme and take account of local delivery structures and opportunities.

Strategic considerations in developing EU PEACE PLUS Programme

- Scope of programme We are supportive of the proposed focus of the emerging programme and the associated thematic pillars. The Council believes that this programme presents a huge opportunity to address many of the ongoing challenges facing the region and its capital city. Furthermore, it provides a chance to work across government and sectors to create a new collaborative partnership which supports co-design and shared delivery.
- 2. Scaling opportunity and impact through Community Planning Community planning, the duty led and facilitated by councils, has massive potential to materially assist the EU PEACE PLUS programme, but importantly, in its own right, is a citizen and locality-based statutory instrument to materially contribute to Covid Recovery and future public services delivery. The Council-led Community Planning Partnerships need to be utilised to their full potential with greater integration into wider Policy delivery, with the subsequent Community Plans being inter-departmentally recognised as hubs for locality based joint investment.

We therefore welcome the reference to community planning in Theme 1 but would also highlight the conflict in narrative to exploring other governance relationships. As a Council we seek further engagement with SEUPB on how we build upon existing community planning structures in supporting this programme and development of co-design local Community Peace Action Plans.

3. Concentration of need and opportunity in Urban Areas - Cities have an important role in creating sustainable economic growth acting as regional hubs for both employment,

creativity and innovation as well as being concentrations of deprivation and need. The programme consultation document from SEUPB refers to 'Smart **Towns and Villages**' but needs to also include reference to 'smart cities and hubs. An Innovation and Growth Commission has been established and Innovation Commissioner in place within Belfast.

The Programme has a clear and "renewed focus ... on rural and border communities in particular through initiatives which will support regeneration and reimaging of rural areas". However, this should not be at the expense of support for regeneration and reimaging urban areas. We would urge the Programme not to ignore the challenges faced by the region's urban centres, particularly because of the impact of COVID19 and to recognise the role of urban centres in supporting economic and social life beyond their geographic boundaries at a regional level. While the benefits of agglomeration mean that cities are places of productivity, creativity and opportunity; they are also places where inequalities in education, housing and health are most exposed. There remains a clear need for sustained focus on peace and reconciliation efforts in cities/urban areas, as recent events have shown.

4. Encouraging and embedding real partnership and co-design approach - The Council believes that this programme presents a huge opportunity to address many of the ongoing challenges facing the region and its capital city. Furthermore, it provides a chance to work across government and sectors to create a new collaborative partnership, which supports codesign and shared delivery.

We note that emerging programme proposals outlines 'how government, community and individuals will work together to build a united community, based on equality of opportunity and the desirability of good relations and reconciliation and will achieve change against key priorities' (programme document, page 13). We look forward to better understanding how this broad aim translates into financial commitment to building inclusive, diverse communities. As with previous Peace programmes it is welcome that there are specific horizontal principles on equality which are stipulated by the European Commission under EU Programme including PEACE PLUS, and that applications under the Programme will be assessed against these requirements.

We welcome that the content of the Programme has been developed through community engagement, including citizens that are most marginalised, underprivileged communities, BAME communities, disabled persons and women accessing education and business. This demonstration of the Peace Plus Programme as a mechanism to promote equality of opportunity is further reflected in the diverse range of linked policies including strategies relating to disability and older people. We welcome SEUPB's commitment to monitoring for equality of opportunity.

Whilst it is welcome that the Programme Development process is supported by a Programme Development Steering Group (PDSG), comprising of members with expertise in issues relating to social inclusion, gender equality and non-discrimination, and how these relate to peace transition – this development is at the macro level. This demonstration of commitment to equality of opportunity should be reflected at local level.

- **5.** Thematic Feedback the following section outlines a number of strategic considerations linked to the thematic proposals set out in the consultation document. This feedback is submitted given the current limitations and functionality of the online survey.
 - (i) The Empowering communities theme refers to institutional capacity but also needs to also focus on building community and civic capacity to support implementation and sustainability.

- (ii) 'Youth and Mental Health and Wellbeing' is a major issue for the city and goes beyond 'Youth', effecting older groups, particularly with the impact of Covid which has contributed significantly to creating mental health and social wellbeing challenges and widened existing health inequalities which existed across the city and wider region. Addressing health inequalities, with a specific focus on mental health and social wellbeing is a key focus of the Belfast Agenda and work of the community planning partnership within Belfast.
- (iii) Learning and Together Education Programme council would like to make SEUPB aware of the established Educational Inequalities Task Group, which has been formed under Belfast Agenda and community planning to develop and manage the delivery and coordination of programmes and projects to address educational inequalities across Belfast.
- (iv) Collaborative Health and Social Care Addressing health inequalities, with a specific focus on mental health and social wellbeing is a key focus of the Belfast Agenda and work of the community planning partnership within Belfast. Strong partnership with health colleagues, communities and service users in place and work underway to create an enhanced and integrated care system within the city and wider region. Council would also like to highlight the associated importance of supporting the development of innovative community based health care interventions, particularly with a focus on early intervention and prevention this is particularly important in areas adversely affected by the NI conflict and its legacy where community trauma has to be addressed through holistic approaches.
- (v) Mental Health and Emotional Wellbeing in addition to Theme 3. Belfast's Community Planning Partnership is determined to work in collaboration to create a healthier city. The interrelated societal challenges linked to drugs, alcohol and mental health were identified as a key area of focus which was felt could be addressed in a more collaborative and holistic way. The Partnership recently agreed to explore a complex lives model to support vulnerable people and those 'at risk' from alcohol, drugs and mental health challenges.
- (vi) Rural Regeneration and Social Inclusion there is no reference to Urban Regeneration and Social Inclusion. There is a concentration of deprivation, social issues and need for investment in urban areas and overall regional benefit will only be achieved when urban regeneration and rural regeneration work effectively together.
- (vii) Supporting a sustainable and Better Connected Future. We recommend inclusion of 'digital connectivity'. Accessible environment makes a contribution to people having long, healthy active lives Council is well positioned to enhance and transform public parks and open spaces particularly in areas with high health inequalities. Investment in Council open spaces, particularly in segregated areas across the city, increases the number of venues where people from different backgrounds can meet. This investment could also connect different areas of the city through linking open spaces and promote enhanced access to the environment.
- (viii) Enhanced Sustainable Travel connectivity we strongly support proposal for new rail rolling stock and infrastructure upgrades to facilitate the introduction of an hourly service between Dublin and Belfast. Also, we would like to see potential investment in cycling infrastructure included in this programme. Council strongly supports the focus and proposed investment in 'Strategic Planning and Engagement' to increase cross border collaboration. We highlight the work being taken forward through the Belfast Regional City Deal in strengthening collaboration across local government in NI and exploring opportunities to further enhance cross border relation including economic and commuter (e.g. Dublin-Belfast Economic Corridor) and wish to explore how we can develop stronger relations with Dublin and other economic hubs in context of UK's exit from EU.

- (ix) Council strongly supports the focus and proposed investment in 'Maintaining and Forging Relationships between Citizens. It is important to note that the legislation and statutory guidance for community planning outlines the need for Community Planning Partnerships to ensure they seek to involve the 'Community' (in its widest sense) in the community planning process, to ensure that community has a voice into the process and that views are taken into account. While the recently established Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise Sectoral Advisory Panel (Belfast) increases participation and representation of the third sector in Belfast within community planning the Partnership would also have aspirations to increase the involvement of the wider community or citizens within the community planning process, particularly with a local focus. Considering the population of Belfast has grown in excess of 340,000 residents this is clearly a challenging task. We suggest the potential creation of an 'Innovation Fund' to enable and encourage the development of innovative ideas and demonstrator pilots/interventions to address societal and community challenges, which has been further exacerbated by the Covid-19 Pandemic.
- (x) Equality The gathering of evidence/information for Section 75 categories is grouped into a single overall category. Similarly needs, priorities and experiences groups some of the nine identities. This approach means that when the screening questions are applied the flow from evidence to policy impact is not always clear for example evidence on disability reads across to needs of disabled people, and the impact of the programme and appropriate mitigations can be comprehensively considered. We fully acknowledge the challenges of the screening process, particularly at the macro level, however consideration of providing evidence in this way could help to inform development and delivery of the programme to a more inclusive and diverse population. We welcome the references to language and access requirements and also references to proposed legislation to deal with language and culture issues the fund could also be used to promote understanding of the issues relating to indigenous minority languages in Northern Ireland.

The Council looks forward to building upon the work of the previous PEACE and INTERREG programmes and continuing to work in partnership with SEUPB at every opportunity to deliver on the ambitious set out within these proposals and to contribute positively to building peace and prosperity across Northern Ireland.

We look forward to further engagement with the SEUPB and NI Executive colleagues to discuss how we can collectively ensure we maximise the impact of the PEACE PLUS programme. This will include the role of local authorities, working in partnership, in co-designing and implementing impactful projects, programmes and interventions under the thematic area outlined as well as developing the Peace Action Plans.
