1	Relevant Background Information						
1.1	<p>Members will recall that, at your meeting on 16 April, you were advised that an anonymous objection had been received against the applications for the transfer and renewal of the Entertainments Licence for Mynt nightclub.</p> <table border="0"> <tr> <td>Premises and Location</td> <td>Ref. 1.2	The objection raised issues around the management of the premises and their links to Mr Ryan Morton and Mr Daniel Morton who had, in the past, been the subject of legal proceedings by the Council.						
1.3	After consideration, you agreed to exercise your discretion to consider the objection and to ascertain the roles of the various personnel involved in the operation and management of the business.						
1.4	The previous licensee for Mynt was also Mr Lawrence Bannon in his capacity as a director of Metropolitan Inns (NI) Limited. However, Members may recall that Metropolitan Inns (NI) Limited entered into administration in November 2012 hence the reason for the transfer application.						
2	Key Issues						
2.1	In association with the transfer and renewal applications, extensive refurbishment works took place and the premises were closed for some time.						

2.2	The works have recently been completed to the satisfaction of the Service and the venue reopened on 28 March 2014. A variation application was not required as there was no increase in occupancy or extension to the permitted hours to provide entertainment.
2.3	The Building Regulations application received for the refurbishment works is in the name of Ms Lauren Morton of Newgate Inns Limited. Ms Lauren Morton is the daughter of Mr Daniel Morton. The directors of Newgate Inns Limited are Ms Lauren Morton and Ms Alana Fox, who will both be working in the club.
2.4	Mr Bannon submitted a letter to the Service in response to the objection. A copy of this letter is attached.
2.5	Mr Bannon has confirmed that the new enterprise is a joint venture between himself and Newgate Inns Ltd. Whilst he is still the owner of the property he has leased the premises to Newgate Inns Limited for a period of 10 years to help with the business going forward and to provide some financial assistance. Whilst it is a joint venture he will be the operations director, responsible for the 'day to day' running and management of the business including entertainment licensing and all compliance matters.
2.6	Mr Bannon has also confirmed that both he and Newgate Inns Limited will make joint financial decisions including staff appointments and dismissals.
2.7	The Service has also been advised that Mr Ryan Morton's only role will be promoting the club and that both Mr Daniel Morton and Mr Ryan Morton will play no part in the management of the club.
2.8	Mr Bannon has confirmed that he will be present at your meeting in order to address the Committee and answer any questions the Committee may have.
	Health, safety and welfare issues
2.9	Since the premise reopened on 28 th March 2014, 2 during performance inspections have been carried out which revealed that the terms and conditions of the Entertainments Licence were being adhered to and that the management of the premises was satisfactory. Some minor issues were identified which were quickly rectified.
	Noise Issues
2.10	The Environmental Protection Unit (EPU) has been consulted in relation to the application and confirmed that they have received one complaint since the premise reopened on 28 th March 2014.
2.11	The complaint related to noise emanating from the premise as a result of doors being left in the open position to allow patrons in the smoking area to avail of the entertainment. The Licensee has been made aware that this is a breach of the terms and condition of licence and has confirmed that he will ensure that this does not occur in future.
	PSNI
2.12	The PSNI has been consulted and has no objection to the applications. A copy of its correspondence is attached.

1.0 Relevant Background Information							
1.1	Applications were received on 20th February from the Department for Social Development for the renewal and variation of the Seven-day Annual Outdoor Entertainments Licence for Custom House Square.						
1.2	The outdoor licence is based on the Council's standard conditions to provide outdoor musical entertainment. However, there is also an indoor Entertainments Licence in place at the venue to facilitate the holding of events in a marquee based on the Council's standard conditions to provide music, singing, dancing or any other entertainment of a like kind.

1.3	Members are advised that both of these Entertainments Licences has been in place since the Square was redeveloped in 2005.						
1.4	Members may recall that an objection was received last year to the renewal of the Outdoor Entertainments Licence from a resident of the Square acting on behalf of the Custom House Residence Management Board.						
1.5	On 17th April, 2013, the Committee heard representations from the licensee and the objector and, having considered all the matters, agreed to renew the Licence subject to the following condition that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Entertainment be restricted to no more than three successive nights in any given seven day period, with exceptions being made for Bank and Public Holidays. 						

1.6	However, due to information which came to light after your meeting ,you agreed to reconsider this decision at your meeting of 19 June 2013 and receive a delegation from the licensee and the promoter of the Belsonic event.
1.7	<p>After reconsidering the application and information presented on 19 June 2013, you agreed to amend the original condition regarding the permitted number of nights of successive entertainment, as follows, that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Entertainment be restricted to no more than three nights in any given seven day period, with an exception being made for Bank or Public Holidays when an additional night will be permitted in that seven day period.
1.8	Specifically for last year's Belsonic event, you also agreed that they could provide two additional nights of entertainment on Tuesday 20 and Wednesday 21 August in addition to the standard restriction relating to the provision of entertainment in any 7 day period. Entertainment was also permitted to be provided to midnight on Sunday 25 August, which was the bank holiday weekend.
1.9	The promoters of Belsonic have confirmed with the Service that, whilst this year they will not be providing entertainment beyond the standard hours, they would like the possibility of providing an additional night over and above the days as specified in para 1.7. They may not require this extra night but need the assurance that if they secure an act they can accommodate the extra night in their programme. If approved the number of nights this year will be less than granted in 2013.
1.10	<p>The standard days and hours for both the Outdoor Entertainments Licence and Indoor Entertainment in a marquee are:</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Monday to Sunday: 11.30 a m to 11.00 p m.</p>
1.11	It's recognised that Custom House Square has grown in popularity since its introduction in 2005 and is regarded by many as a premier outdoor event space, which contributes to the vibrancy of the night time economy. It has hosted numerous and varied musical and cultural events each year, including Belsonic, Lady Boys of Bangkok and the recent Cathedral Quarter Arts Festival.
1.12	A list of the events that took place in the Square last year along with those planned for this year are attached. It should be noted that not all of the events listed require to be licensed for entertainment.

2.0	Key Issues
2.1	<p>Reasons for the variation</p> <p>The licensee has stated that the application to vary the licence is being requested in relation to this year's Belsonic event to facilitate any potential request from the promoters to hold an 8th night of entertainment, which would thereby exceed the quota permitted as a condition on the Entertainments Licence.</p> <p>2.2 The promoters of Belsonic have been in regular contact with Officers of the Service and have advised that this year's event will be held over 7 days. However, they have also indicated that they may wish to hold an 8th night and, following our advice, the licensee is applying for the variation as a measure to cover it should it take place.</p> <p>2.3 At the time of writing this report the promoters of Belsonic have not yet confirmed any proposal to hold an 8th night. However, time is still available to them to do so as they traditionally don't release these dates until closer to the event. Members are advised that to date they have only released acts for 5 nights of their planned 7 night programme.</p>

2.4	The promoter for Belsonic has also confirmed that they will not be operating beyond the standard hours of 11.00 pm.
Representations	
2.5	Public notices of the applications were placed in the Belfast Telegraph and the Irish News within 7 days of the application being made and no objections have been received.
PSNI	
2.6	The Police have been consulted about the applications and have confirmed they have no objections.
2.7	They state that they have been involved with events at the venue since it was first opened in conjunction with Officers of the Council and have not witnessed any incidents or received any reports of incidents from members of the public.
2.8	They also advised us that overall, each event has been well run and they have had a good relationship with each of the organisers that have used the venue. PSNI comments regarding the applications are appended to this report for your information.
Health, safety and welfare issues	
2.9	Officers of the Service have been extensively involved with licensed events at the venue and throughout this time have experienced no difficulties with the licensee or event organisers who have used the Square.
2.10	Officers have also attended the events to carry out during performance inspections and noted no incidents of significance relating to the health, safety or welfare of those present at the events.
2.11	The Service has however received noise complaints as a result of events at the venue, which were received via the Night Time Noise Team and EPU, as outlined below.
Noise Issues	
2.12	The Environmental Protection Unit (EPU) has been consulted in relation to the applications.
2.13	Due to the various residential developments situated in close proximity to the venue, EPU feel it is important to protect the night time period between 11.00pm and 7.00am for residents. They are supportive of all events aimed at improving the attractiveness and diversity of the City but that this should be achieved while in compliance with the relevant legislation and recognising and respecting the rights of residents to enjoy their property by exercising appropriate control of such events, as is expected by the public.
2.14	EPU has confirmed that they have received a number of complaints regarding the use of the Outdoor Entertainments Licence at Custom House Square but no formal action was deemed necessary in relation to these complaints. A summary of the complaints received are as follows: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li data-bbox="247 1713 1460 1825">• Belsonic: A total 4 complaints were received last year. 3 were received over the course of the 8 days and one after the event. In 2012 the event generated a total of 2 complaints.
2.15	An Officer from the Environmental Protection Unit will be available at the meeting to answer any queries Members may have in relation to noise issues.
2.16	Licensee The applicant and/or their representatives will be available at your meeting to answer any queries you may have in relation to the application.

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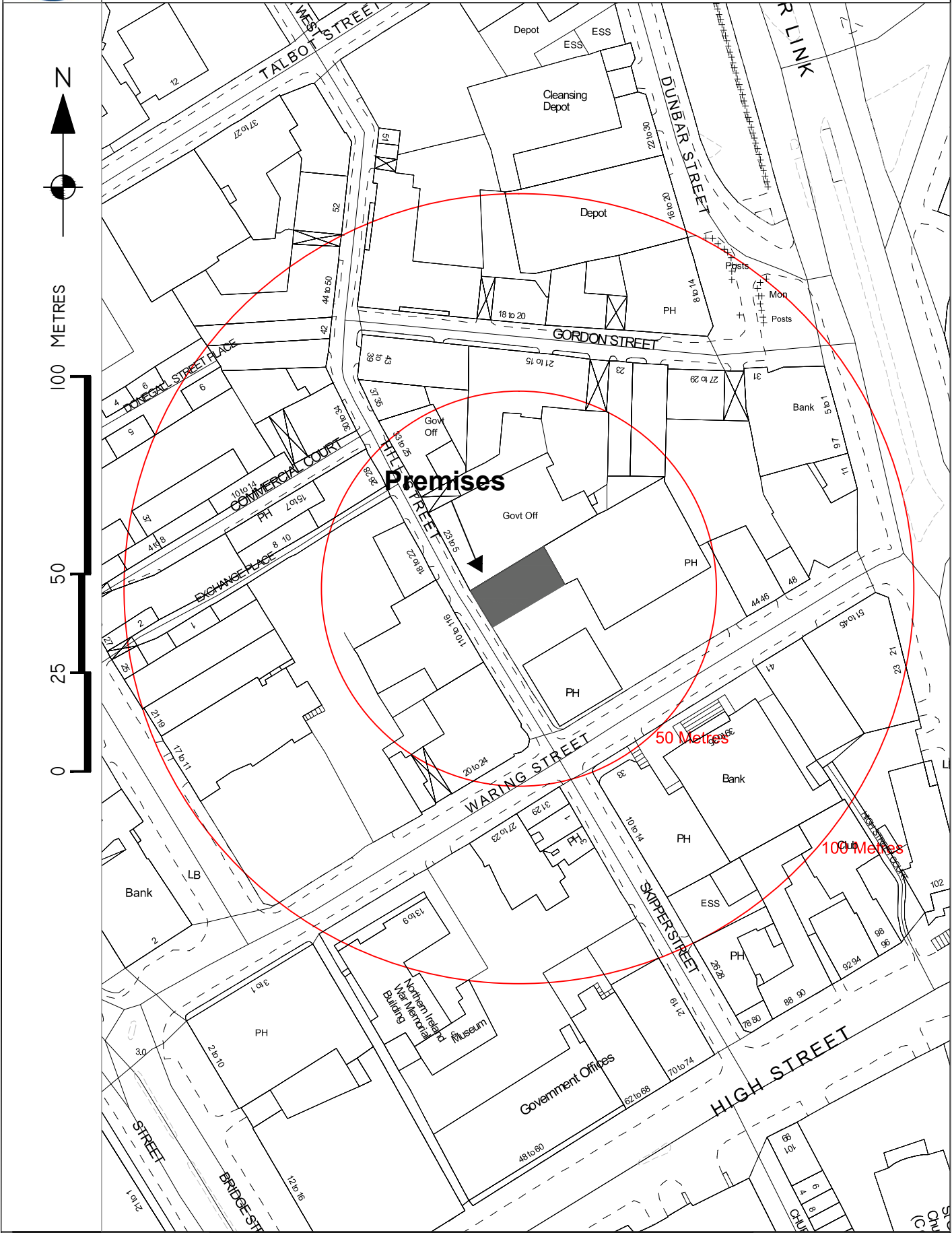

1.4	<p>Last year's Tennents Vital took place on Wednesday 14th, Thursday 15th and Friday 16th August and featured world class acts including Kings of Leon, Snow Patrol and Avicii.</p>
1.5	<p>A total of 23 complaints were received last year with 17 received during the 3 days of the concerts and the remaining 6 arriving after the event. The majority of complaints were received from residents within the immediate areas around the venue. This was significantly less than the 231 complaints received from the 2 day event held in 2012.</p>
1.6	<p>The complaints related to noise disturbance from the concerts and anti-social behaviour, mainly as a result of the Friday night Avicii concert, which had a considerable number of young patrons attending.</p>

2.0	Key Issues
2.1	<p>Members may be aware that the Parks and Leisure Committee have already been informed of this year's event and, at their meeting of the 10th April 2014, agreed for MCD to hold up to 3 concerts at the venue between the 21st and 25th August 2014.</p>
2.2	<p>This was subject to and on condition that the event organisers resolve all operational issues to the Council's satisfaction, that an appropriate legal agreement is completed and that the event organisers meet all statutory requirements including entertainment licensing.</p>
	<p>Tennents Vital 2014</p>
2.3	<p>For this year's event The Killers will perform on Thursday 22nd August and on Sunday 24th August the headline act will be David Guetta. All headline acts will be supported by a number of other acts such as Bastille and Steve Angello. Other supporting acts have still to be confirmed.</p>
2.4	<p>30,000 tickets have been made available for sale on each night. Gates are scheduled to be opened at 4.30 pm with entertainment planned to commence soon after and finish by 11.00 pm.</p>
2.5	<p>The promoter has extensive experience of organising outdoor events of this scale which includes previous Tennents Vital Concerts at this venue, Botanic Gardens and Ormeau Park.</p>
	<p>Representations</p>
2.6	<p>As a result of the public notices written representation was received outside the 28 day statutory period objecting to the application.</p>
2.7	<p>The nature of the objection relates to music being too loud from the concerts and music festivals held at the venue, for such a residential area. It also states that the music can be heard a considerable distance away.</p>

2.8	Under the terms of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (NI) Order 1985, the Committee, when considering an application, must have regard to any representation which is received inside the 28 day statutory period. Where objections have been received outside the 28 day period you have discretion, but not a duty, to hear those objections.
2.9	Members should note that the Council is not prohibited from taking all relevant representations into account, whether they have been communicated by objectors or others, early or late, or in any other way.
2.10	When deciding if you wish to consider the objection received outside the 28 day period, facts that you may wish to take into account could include the relevance of the objection, the proximity of the objector to the venue, how far outside the 28 day period the objection was received, or any other matters that appear important in the circumstances at hand.
2.11	The objector has confirmed in writing that he is unable to attend due to being out of the country and that he wishes his objection to be considered by the Licensing Committee.
2.12	A copy of each letter from the objector is attached.
PSNI	
2.13	The PSNI has been consulted about the application for the renewal of the Entertainments Licence and have advised that as the promoter for the event is very reputable, experienced in their field and to date have included police in all of their planning meetings they have no concerns at this stage.
2.14	As with all such events a series of detailed planning meetings will be held, some of which have begun, to look at traffic management, transport and any wider operational policing issues. Anti-social behaviour which occurred in the Stockman's Lane area as people disembarked buses is an aspect that will given due consideration at the planning meetings.
NIFRS	
2.15	The Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service, as with other agencies, will be invited to attend a pre-event meeting and will be provided with all relevant documentation in advance of that meeting.
Health, safety and welfare issues	
2.16	Officers of the Service were closely involved with the planning, running and subsequent review of the outdoor events held at the venue last year. We have experienced no difficulties in working with the event organiser.
2.17	Following the anti-social behaviour issues that arose from the Avicii concert held on the final night of last year's event the promoter recognises the need to increase their provisions for this year's event, particularly for the David Guetta concert being held on Sunday 24 th August, which has a similar audience profile to Avicii.
2.18	Additional stewards will be in place around the venue, car and coach parks and along the route to the venue in order to appropriately protect resident's properties. This operation will be carried out in conjunction with Officers of the PSNI.

2.19	Appropriate toilet facilities will also be provided at stages along the route and within the car and coach parks. Appropriate first aid and ambulance provisions will also be provided, where required.
2.20	The Service will also coordinate the work of Community Safety Officers and Park Wardens to provide support to the promoter and PSNI regarding alcohol enforcement for the event.
	Noise issues
2.21	The Environmental Protection Unit (EPU) has been consulted in relation to the application and the proposals for this year's Tennents Vital event.
2.22	The Unit is supportive of all events aimed at improving the attractiveness and diversity of the City and are committed to working with licensees to ensure these events are successful and achieve a balance between the rights of residents, the event, the promotion of the city and the wider benefits to the local economy.
2.23	Following the significant number of complaints received in 2012, Council Officers and the promoter worked extensively in order to manage the noise generated and minimise the potential for noise disturbance. The promoter worked closely with Officers throughout the event and a protocol was in operation to record and communicate complaints received.
2.24	Similar procedures will be implemented this year to raise awareness of the event and minimise the noise disturbance.
2.25	Members should also recognise that noise generated by large scale outdoor concerts is likely to lead to some level of disturbance for local residents. Even if guideline levels are met there is no guarantee that complaints will not be received. Conversely, if a recommended level is exceeded this may not necessarily lead to complaints as people may be prepared to tolerate the event because it will only last for a limited period of time.
2.26	An officer from EPU will be available at your meeting to advise on any concerns regarding the proposed event and any potential noise impact it may have on nearby residents.
	Licensee
2.27	The applicant has been informed of the objection and has been invited to attend your meeting so that you may hear their representations relating to the renewal of the Licence.

3.0	Resource Implications
3.1	<u>Financial</u> Officers will be required to carry out inspections at both events but this is catered for within existing budgets.
3.2	<u>Human Resources</u> None
3.3	<u>Asset and Other Implications</u> None

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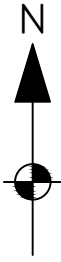
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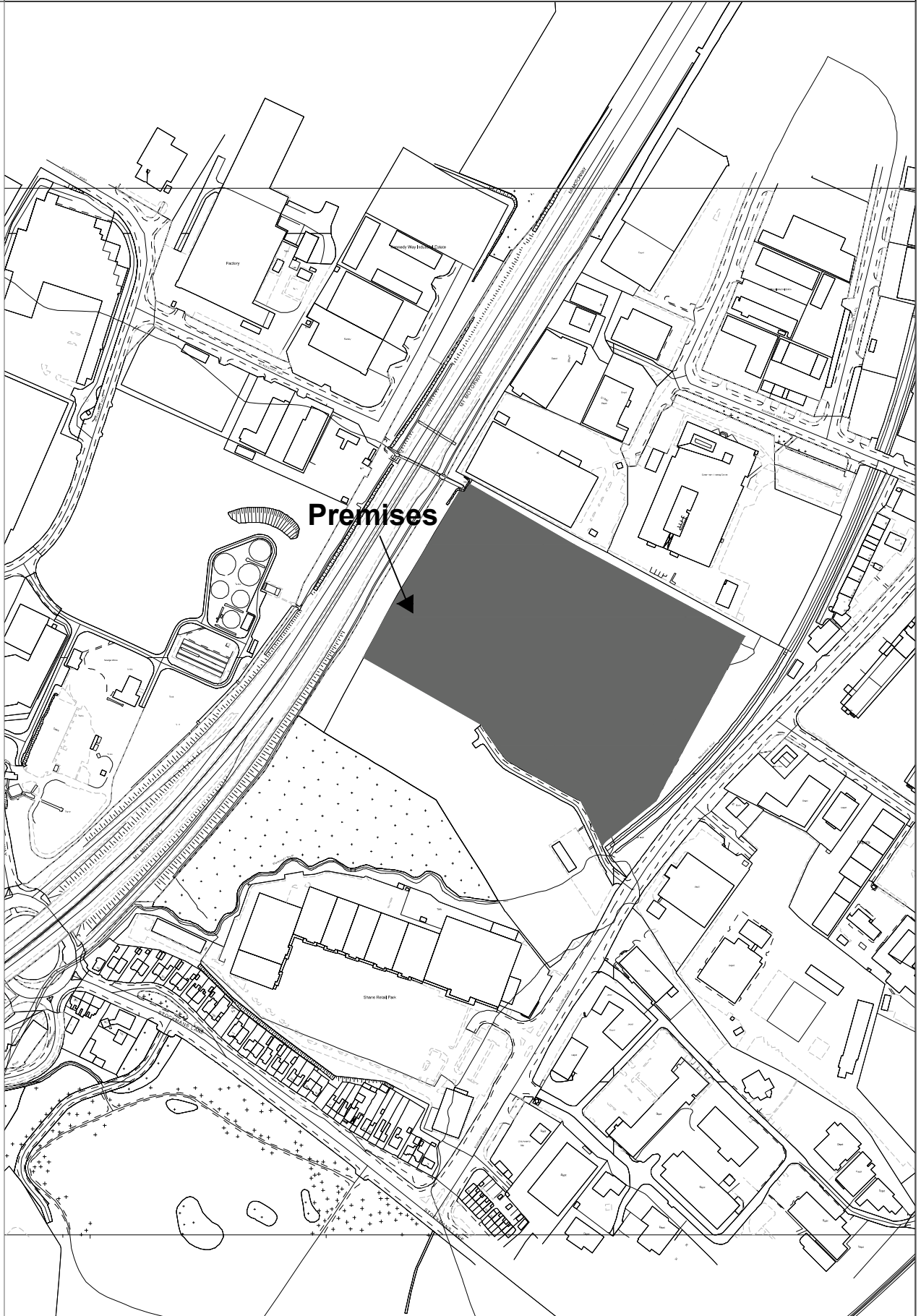

1.0	Relevant Background Information
1.1	A request has been received from the organisers of Féile an Phobail to hold a 10 day music event at Falls Park, to be held within a marquee, running from Thursday 1 st to Sunday 10 th August.
1.2	The event is promoted as a celebration of community, creativity, arts and sports. It has operated from different venues in West Belfast since 1988 but has been established in Falls Park for the last 3 years.
1.3	Falls Park currently has a Seven-day Annual Outdoor Entertainments Licence and a Fourteen-day Occasional Licence for a marquee and both have been used to hold numerous types of events. The Licences are held by the Parks and Leisure Department of the Council and are transferred to the promoter for the duration of their event.
1.4	The days and hours during which entertainment may be provided both outdoors and in a marquee are:- <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Monday to Sunday: 11.30 a m to 11.00 p m.
1.5	In addition, the following special conditions are attached to both the Marquee and Outdoor licences: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Maximum numbers will be agreed at the discretion of the Building Control Service and will vary depending upon individual concert set up proposals 2. Prior to any event taking place the promoters are required to demonstrate evidence of early consultation and have in place a robust system of dealing with any complaints, which has been agreed in advance with the Council 3. Any requests to provide entertainment later than 23:00 hrs must be considered by the Licensing Committee and therefore must be made at least 3 months in advance of the proposed event. 4. Should the Council receive a significant number of noise complaints for any event which has successive nights of entertainment permitted beyond 23:00hrs or if a complaint about an event beyond 23:00hrs is of major concern, then those successive nights with later hours may be subject to reduction and the promoter should have appropriate arrangements in place should this occur.

2.0	Key Issues
2.1	A range of events will be held in the marquee providing a variety of music such as Irish traditional, rock, indie rock, folk and ska music and will include well known performers such as Kaiser Chiefs, Frances Black and Boyzone.
2.2	The organisers have requested that the Committee give consideration to permitting five nights of entertainment to run beyond 11.00 pm to 12.00 am on 1 st , 2 nd , 7 th , 8 th and 9 th August. This is materially less additional hours than the licence as granted for in relation to last year's event.
2.3	A copy of the events running order is attached.
2.4	As this is not an application to vary the terms of the marquee licence, but a request for Council's permission to extend the hours under an existing licence condition, there is no requirement for public advertisement in this case.
2.5	Members may recall that last year you agreed to grant the organisers permission to operate on 7 nights beyond the standard hours of 11.00 pm to 1.00 am, in addition to two Sunday nights when entertainment was extended to 12.00 am.
2.6	The Service has received a copy of the Event Management Plan and other relevant event details. Officers are currently liaising with the organisers to ensure that all technical requirements will be met and work is ongoing in this regard.
2.7	Members are also advised that, through a series of meetings, the organisers have consulted with residents in the vicinity of the Park and the Service has not received any objection from them. The organisers have also stated that residents have shown no concerns about the event as part of their consultations with them.
2.8	Representatives of Féile an Phobail will be available at your meeting should you wish to seek further information on their proposals.
	PSNI
2.9	The PSNI have been consulted in relation to the event and they have confirmed that the organisers have been in contact with them about it. The police have also been informed of the proposed extension of hours.
2.10	Members are advised that, as with all such events, a series of detailed planning meetings will be held, some of which have begun, to look at traffic management, transport and any wider operational policing issues.
	NIFRS
2.11	The Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service have also been consulted about the application. As with other similar events they will be invited to a pre-event meeting and provided with relevant documentation in advance of that meeting.
	Health, safety and welfare issues
2.12	Officers from the Service have previously carried out during performance inspections over the duration of other events organised by Féile An Phobail and have always found the organisers to be professional in their approach and have had no issues with the health, safety and welfare management of the events during that time.

	Noise issues
2.13	The Environmental Protection Unit (EPU) has been consulted in relation to the request for late night entertainment to run to 12.00 am on 5 occasions for the event at Falls Park.
2.14	The Unit is supportive of all events aimed at improving the attractiveness and diversity of the City. They are committed to working with licensees to ensure these events are successful and to achieve a balance between the rights of residents, the event, the promotion of the city and the wider benefits to the local economy.
2.15	Given the cumulative impact of several late consecutive nights and potential sleep disturbance to nearby residents, Officers are concerned that there is a greater potential for complaints after 11.00pm. Members are reminded that the Clean Neighbourhood And Environment Act 2011 gives councils additional powers in relation to entertainment noise after 11.00pm.
2.16	Last year the Noise Team received 22 noise complaints over the course of the 10 day festival. No complaint resulted in any formal action being taken by the Council.
2.17	Officers are currently working with the organisers and their representatives regarding a suitable noise assessment and noise management plan for the festival. The noise assessment must demonstrate that noise from the event will not cause unreasonable disturbance to commercial and residential premises.
2.18	Officers will consider all reports and supporting information to ensure the technical requirements are in accordance with all the relevant legislation and guidance
2.19	An officer from EPU will be available at your meeting to advise on any concerns regarding the proposed event and any potential noise impact it may have on nearby residents.

3.0	Resource Implications
3.1	<u>Financial</u> Officers will be required to carry out inspections at the event but this is catered for within existing budgets.
3.2	<u>Human Resources</u> None.
3.3	<u>Asset and Other Implications</u> None.



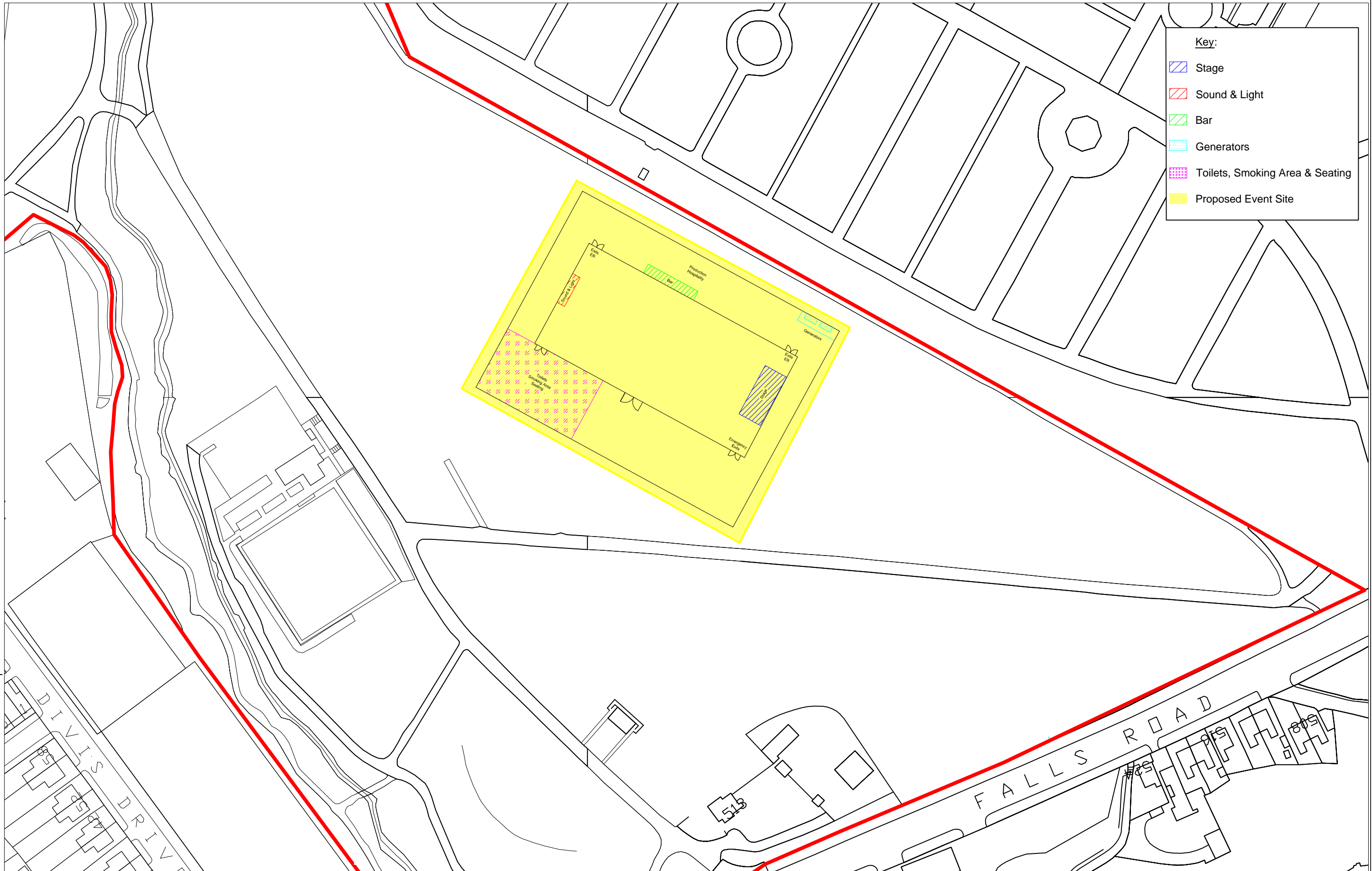

1.5	Members will recall that last year a total of 18 objections were received to this application. At a Special Meeting, held on 26 th June 2013, you considered the matter and agreed to grant the application, which was utilised for the Ardoyne Fleadh. The Committee also granted permission for the event to provide entertainment to 12.00am on two of the nights.
1.6	The festival took place from Friday 23 rd to Sunday 25 th August 2013.
1.7	A total of 6 complaints were received. 5 were received during the course of the event and 1 afterwards. 119 complaints were received about the event held in 2012.

2.0	Key Issues
2.1	In addition to the renewal application, the applicant is also requesting permission to run each night of this year's event beyond the standard hours of 11.00 pm to 12.00 am.
2.2	This year the organisers propose to hold the event over three days on Friday 22 nd , Saturday 23 rd and Sunday 24 th August from 8.00 pm to 12.00 am.
2.3	The organisers have advised that the primary purpose of the licence is to provide a facility for the school and the local Community Centre to hold outdoor events and provide entertainment in a controlled, managed and safe environment.
2.4	The site build will commence on Thursday 21 st August with the take down being undertaken on Monday 25 th August.
2.5	The Ardoyne Fleadh Project is now in its 23 rd year and plays host to a number of local acts of music, drama, comedy and family entertainment. The organisers have informed the Service that the acts for this year's event have still to be confirmed; however they are expected to be of the same nature and genre as previous years.
	Representations
2.6	Public notices of the applications have been placed within 7 days of the application being made and no objections have been received within the 28 day statutory period.
	PSNI
2.7	The PSNI have been consulted in relation to the application and the request to operate the event to 12.00am on each night. They have also confirmed that the organisers of the Fleadh have already been in contact with them about it. However, their response is outstanding at the time of writing this report but will be available at your meeting.
	NIFRS
2.8	The Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service have been consulted regarding the application and proposed event and have, in principle, no objection to the application. However, as with other outdoor licences, they will be invited to the pre-event meeting and will be provided with all relevant documentation in advance of any proposed concert to work with Officers of the Service regarding any technical requirements that need to be met.
	Health, safety and welfare issues
2.9	Last year the organisers worked with Council Officers on all aspects of the event. Officers of the Service have already engaged with the applicant and organisers of the Ardoyne Fleadh to ensure that appropriate measures with regard to health, safety and welfare management are again in place at this year's event.

2.10	The applicant is currently developing their Event Management Plan, which includes an appropriate background noise survey, to allow Officers of the Building Control Service and Environmental Protection Unit to assess the documentation and ensure that the relevant technical requirements are complied with.
2.11	In order to comply with the condition of Licence to demonstrate evidence of early consultation in relation to the intended event, the organisers will be sending a letter to residents within the vicinity of the venue at least 3 weeks before the event. This letter will provide information about the particulars of the event and the desired finish time of 12.00am. The letter will be agreed with the Service before it is issued.
2.12	Representatives of the Ardoyne Fleadh Project will be available should you wish to seek further information on these proposals.
	Noise issues
2.13	An initial consultation has taken place with the Environmental Protection Unit (EPU) in relation to the application and the proposals for this year's Ardoyne Fleadh Project.
2.14	The Unit is supportive of all events aimed at improving the attractiveness and diversity of the City and are committed to working with licensees to ensure these events are successful and achieve a balance between the rights of residents, the event, the promotion of the city and the wider benefits to the local economy.
2.15	An acoustic consultant has been appointed and as previously noted; an appropriate background noise survey will be carried out and documented in the form of a report. A meeting to discuss noise issues and the formulation of a noise management plan will be organised in due course with the organisers to determine what levels will achieve this.
2.16	Members should also recognise that noise generated by outdoor concerts is likely to lead to some level of disturbance for local residents. 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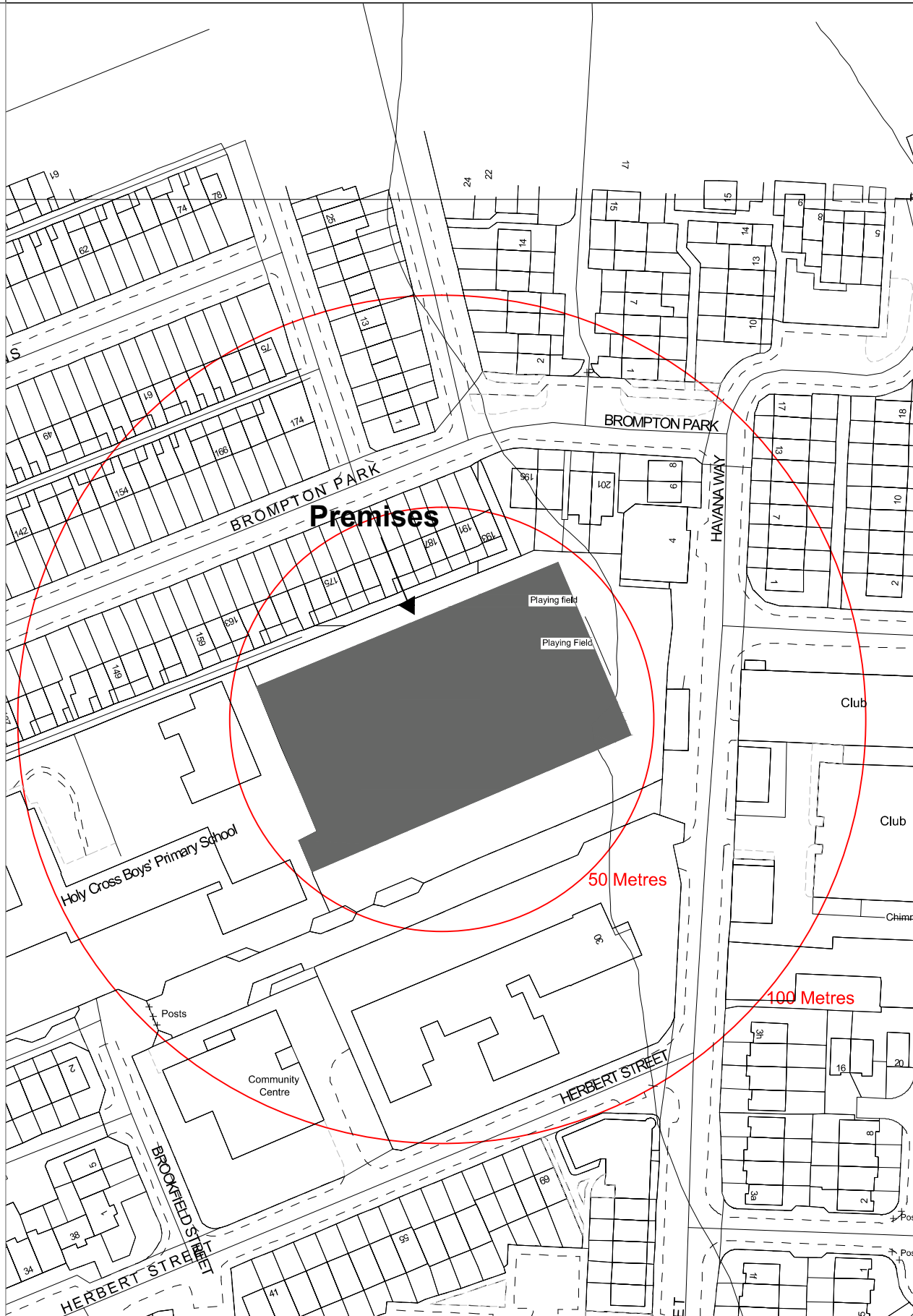

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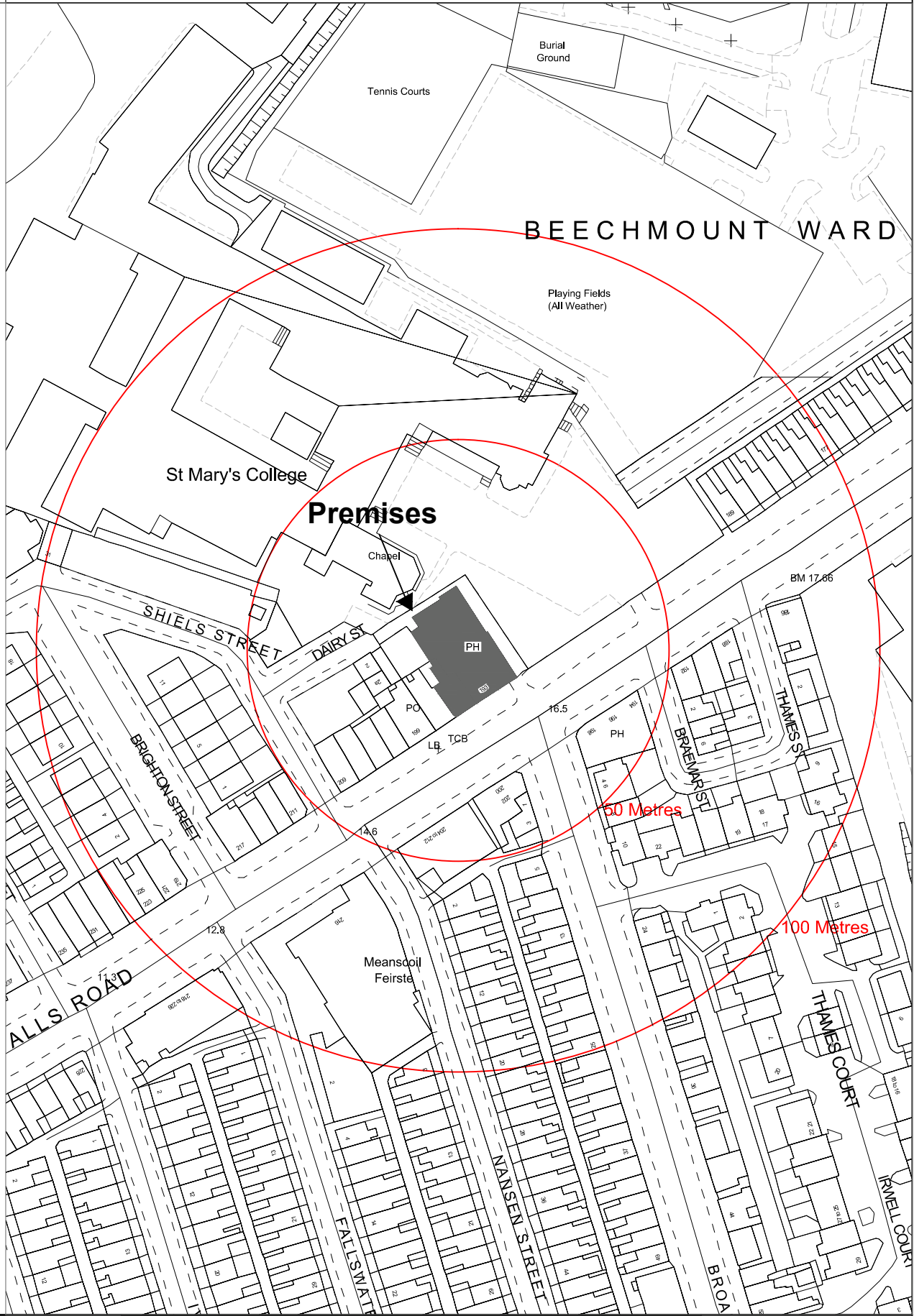

The committee may also be aware that the industry is enduring hard times and it is a very competitive market and to enable us to remain competitive within the market we are placed, we believe the following;

It is vital for us to meet our customers' needs and expectations. Extending our hours of entertainment on specified nights would enable us to establish a USP for our venue to operate in this area. It would also place us in a better position to compete on an even playing field with our competitors within the Greater Belfast area and the Belfast City Centre which is approx 1.5 miles from our location.

We are acutely aware that the proposed application brings to the fore, concerns the Committee needs to consider and address before granting the Application and in anticipation we are submitting the following in support of our application,

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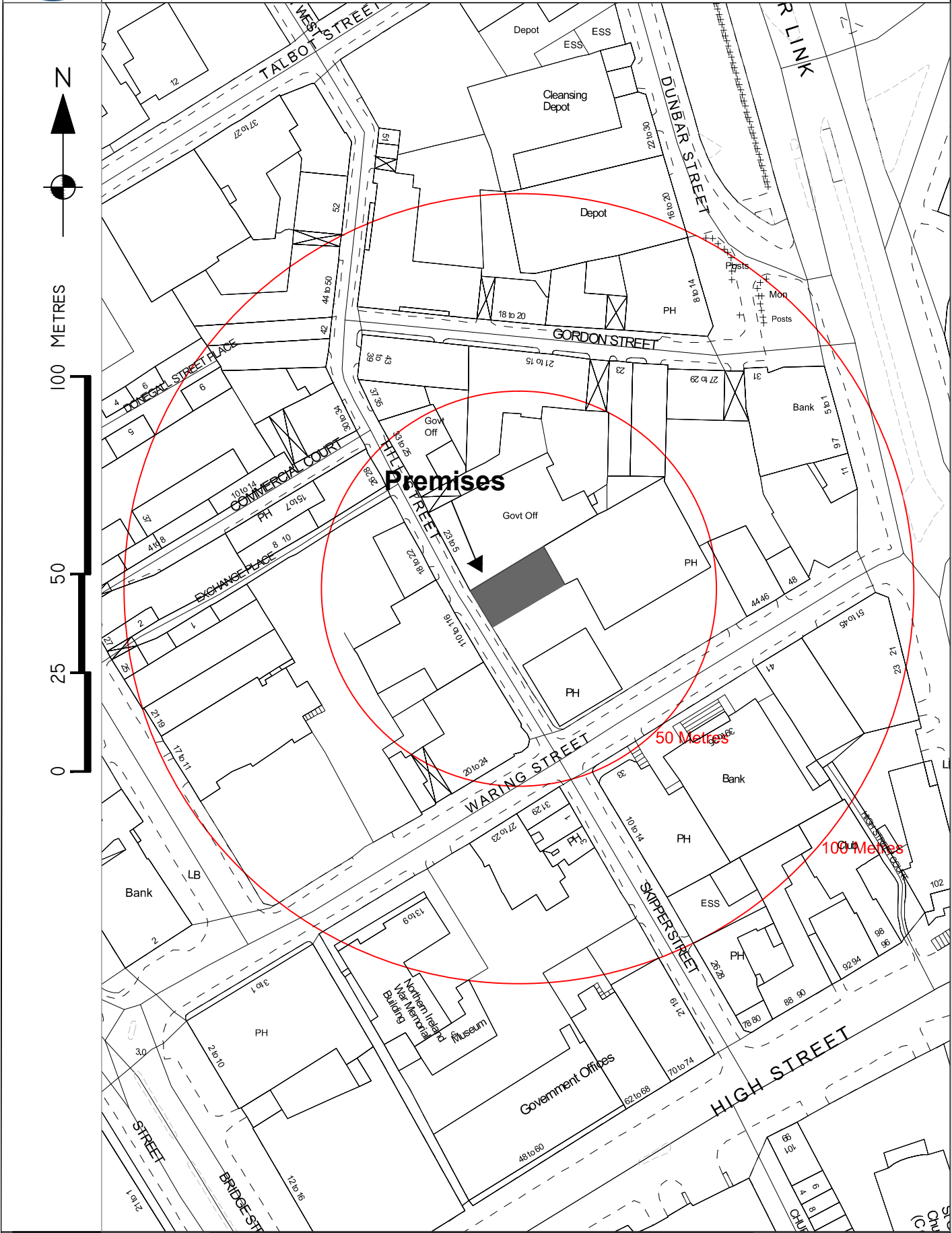

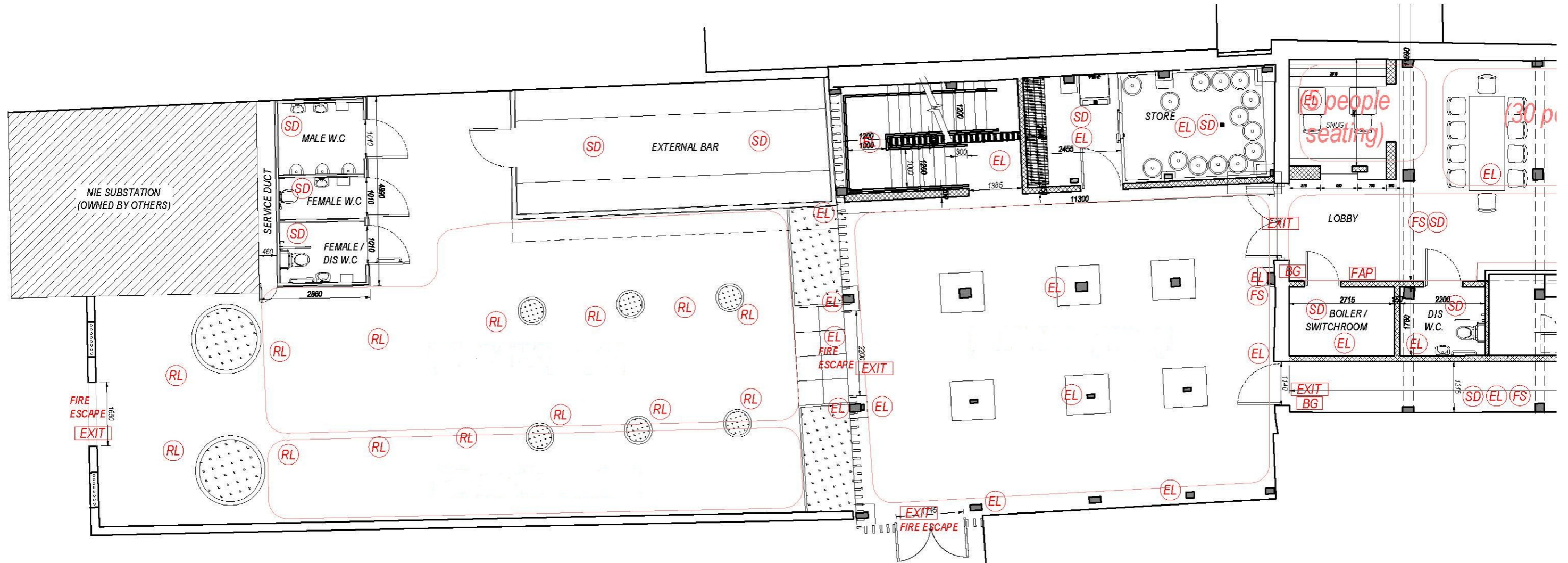

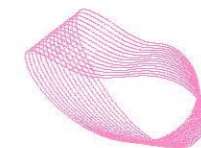

1.1	Members are reminded that, at your meeting on 16 th October 2013, you considered separate Street Trading Licence applications from Miss Monika Szczesna and Mr Peter Robinson for a vacant designated site in Berry Street.
1.2	After consideration, the Committee granted Miss Szczesna a Stationary Street Trading Licence to sell hand crafts, e-cigarettes, e-cigarette accessories and refills, seasonal accessories (Christmas, Easter, Halloween, etc.) leather goods and jewellery from a traditional market stall from Monday to Sunday.
1.3	The annual fee for the Licence is £1017.
1.4	On being granted the Licence, Miss Szczesna had agreed to pay the Licence Fees on a monthly basis; which was £84.75 per month.
1.5	However, shortly after the Licence was granted the Department for Social Development commenced works on the redevelopment of Bank Square in January 2014 and Berry Street was utilised as an access area for the works for approximately 3 months. As a result, the street trading sites located in the area were unavailable to use.
1.6	Miss Szczesna was advised of this when she made her application. In line with Council policy, where circumstances may arise which renders a street trading pitch unsuitable when road works do not permit trading, alternative available designated sites may be offered. However, Miss Szczesna did not avail of any of those sites offered and instead she chose not to trade during the period.
1.7	The Berry Street site had been unavailable from January 2014 to March 2014 and she was not charged for her licence fee for that period. In April 2014, she was further advised that the site was now available and that she could commence trading again and that her monthly licence fees would resume.
1.8	However, Miss Szczesna did not resume trading and is currently not responding to our telephone calls, emails or letters.
1.9	She is licensed until December, 2014 and no payments have been received. As a consequence Miss Szczesna's debt is now £254.25.

Relevant Background Information	
1.1	The Department of Environment has responsibility for Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (Northern Ireland) Order 1985 under Article 3 of, and Schedule 1 to that Order Entertainments Licences are administered by local authorities.
1.2	The legislation was drafted and commenced in 1985 nearly thirty years ago and in many cases the provisions contained within it have been superseded by changes in the way the entertainments industry operates. Additionally the experience of administering the legislation for that length of time has informed the Council that there may be alternative ways to administer the legislation in a way that will deliver efficiencies and make it more cost effective both for the Council and the applicant. It will also give the opportunity to look at updating both the legislation and the Model Terms and Conditions to remove the provisions that no longer have beneficial effect and introduce new ones to deal with innovative issues.
1.3	In the wake of the Joby Murphy tragedy, the Council wrote to the Minister in March 2012 asking for a review of the legislation and offering the assistance of our officers. More recently submissions were made by officers to the Minister highlighting the need to address these issues.
1.4	Minister Mark H Durkan MLA has asked his officials to convene a working group to review the existing legislation, including the associated Model Terms and Conditions and report to him within six months. He has also asked in addition to reviewing the existing legislation that the group address the anomaly between the differing hours during which entertainments may be provided and the sale and consumption of alcohol.
1.5	Recognising the experience acquired from the wide range of premises which provide entertainment in the Belfast area and the many court actions which we have taken, the Minister has asked that we nominate a member of staff to sit on the group. Whilst the letter was sent to the Head of Building Control many of the issues that the group will deal with will be of a legal nature. Given the vast range of experience gained by the Council's Legal Services Section, the Committee might also think it useful to offer that knowledge and experience to the Working Group. I have spoken to the Town Solicitor and he is satisfied to release an officer should the Committee wish to do so. The group will also have officials from the Police Service of Northern Ireland, Northern Ireland Fire and Rescue Service, as well as representatives from Pubs of Ulster, Federation of Clubs and Belfast City Centre Management.

1.6	The first meeting of the group will be held on Thursday 26 June 2014 @ 2pm in Causeway Exchange Belfast. An agenda, and papers, will be issued prior to the meeting.
1.7	A copy of the letter of invitation and Draft Terms of Reference are attached.

WORKING GROUP – REVIEW OF ENTERTAINMENT LICENSING LEGISLATION

Entertainment licences are issued by councils under Article 3 of, and Schedule 1 to, the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (Northern Ireland) Order 1985 and may be issued where certain categories of entertainment are provided, for example theatrical performances, music or contests such as boxing, pool or darts.

An entertainment licence may contain terms, conditions and restrictions regarding all, or any, of the following:

- regulating conduct, days and hours of use, and general arrangement of the place;
- securing adequate fire precautions;
- securing the provision of facilities for the disabled;
- securing the provision of adequate sanitary appliances and things used in connection with such appliances;
- preventing persons in the neighbourhood being unreasonably disturbed by noise; and
- securing that there is in force a policy of insurance regarding the death of, or bodily injury, to any person on or about the premises.

Councils are required to have regard to any model terms, conditions and restrictions issued by the Department, but they are not obliged to comply with them. The extant Model Terms, Conditions and Restrictions for Indoor Entertainments were published

in 1986 and include terms which are under the broad headings of general rules, control and operation, and fire precaution.

As part of my Department's business improvement programme I am committed to establishing a working group to review the existing legislation which provides for entertainment licensing. My aim is for the working group to report to me within six months.

I also believe that a common position on drinking and entertainment licences should be endorsed by the Assembly. In particular there is a need to address the existing anomaly between the liquor and entertainment licensing systems where for example a club can have an entertainment licence which runs until 3am but by law, it must stop serving alcohol at 1am.

I invite you, or a member of your staff, to be part of this working group. I believe the working group would benefit from the experience Belfast City Council can bring from dealing with applications from such a wide range of venues/establishments and its involvement in court action. Draft terms of reference are attached for your information.
