1.1	To consider applications for the erection of dual language street signs for six existing streets within the city.					
2.0	Recommendation					
2.1	The Committee is asked to agree to the erection of a second street nameplate in Irish at, Ligoniel Place, Mountainhill Road, Norfolk Parade, Ladybrook Grove, Greenan and Alliance Avenue.					
3.0	Main Report					
3.1	Key Issues The Council may erect a second street nameplate in a language other than English pursuant to Article 11 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (NI) Order 1995.					
3.2	Members are asked to consider the following applications to erect a second street nameplate showing the name of the street expressed in a language other than English. The second language is Irish.

In accordance with the Council's policy for the erection of dual language street signs, surveys of all persons appearing on the electoral register plus owners or tenants in actual possession					
	of commercial premises, for the above streets were carried out and the following responses were received.

3.9	<ul> <li>10 occupiers (47.62%) were in favour of the erection of a second street name plate.</li> <li>2 occupiers (9.52%) were not in favour of the erection of a second street name plate.</li> <li>9 occupiers (42.86%%) did not respond to the survey.</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>58 occupiers (42.03%) were in favour of the erection of a second street name plate.</li> <li>80 occupiers (57.97%) did not respond to the survey.</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>86 occupiers (25.60%) were in favour of the erection of a second street name plate.</li> <li>7 occupiers (2.08%) were not in favour of the erection of a second street name plate.</li> <li>4 occupiers (1.19%) had no preference either way.</li> <li>239 occupiers (71.13%) did not respond to the survey.</li> </ul>				
	One resident from Alliance Avenue who is not in support of the dual language street sign feels that funds could be spent on more important items for the area.				
3.12	Assessment against policy				
	The Council's policy on the erection of a second street nameplate requires that at least fifteen percent (15%) of the occupiers surveyed must be in favour of the proposal to erect a second street sign in a language other than English, to progress to Committee for consideration.				
3.13	the surveys listed above demonstrate compliance with the threshold contained within olicy. However, the Committee is reminded that the Council retain a residual discretion r the Policy to decide to erect or not to erect a street sign in a language other than sh in certain circumstances. This will be done on a case-by-case basis.				
3.14	The Policy states that it may be appropriate to depart from the procedures in this Policy when there are clear reasons for doing so. This may include taking into account: (a) the views of the Occupiers of the street; (b) the results of the initial assessment for the application, including any identified potential adverse impacts on equality, good relations and rural needs;				

	<ul> <li>(c) consideration of the local context of the application;</li> <li>(d) any other Council policies or strategies related to the application; and</li> <li>(e) all material considerations relating to the application.</li> </ul>			
3.15	Financial and Resource Implications			
	There is a cost of approximately £2,610 to cover the cost of the manufacturing and erection of approximately 21 dual language street signs. The cost for these street signs has been allowed for in the current budget.			
3.16	Equality or Good Relations Implications/Rural Needs Assessment			
	Each application for a dual language street sign is subject to an initial assessment for any potential adverse impacts on equality, good relations and rural needs.			
	The initial assessments and elected member notification carried out for the 6 applications being considered did not identify any potential adverse impacts to prevent the surveys being carried out. However, the Committee is entitled to take into account the concerns raised by the residents as set out above in arriving to their decision.
